Queen's University Belfast


- 9th Oldest University in the UK founded in 1845

- Member of the Russell Group

Ulster University

- 4 campuses Belfast, Jordanstown, Coleraine, Magee
- 25,000 students
- Heritage dates back to 1849

Key revolutionary figures

- 3 signatories of the Declaration of Independence were born in NI

Over 200 US companies headquartered here! e.g. Liberty Mutual, Peak6, AllState, BakerMcKenzie

United States is Northern Ireland's second largest export market

(top exports are whiskey and aeroplane seats!)

Belfast Population 400,000






















What can students expect in Northern Ireland?

- 3 year system similar to England and Wales
- No general education declare major at point of application (through UCAS)
- Transparent application process clear entrance requirements
- Direct entry to professional majors Medicine, Law, Dentistry, Pharmacy etc.
- A blend of British and Irish culture
- A warm welcome

 Northern Ireland is a small place with very friendly people!





What's student life like in the UK?

- Treated as an adult from day 1 students are entering an adult learning environment
- More independent living often student housing is self-catered (no meal plan!)
- Students are focused (declare major at application) and education increasingly offers embedded work experience opportunities/internships
- Generally, less 'timetabled' week than in USA more free time and independent study
- Wednesday afternoons open on many campuses for sports and societies (over 200 at QUB!)



Common Student Support Structures

- Careers Centre part-time work, graduate visa, careers fairs, professional skills support etc.
- Student Wellbeing counselling, out of hours line, learning development services, disability services
- Student finance hardship funding, scholarships
- Academic advising each student will have an advisor of studies in addition to their programme and module directors









Additional opportunities...

- Study Abroad semester or year abroad
- Student entrepreneurship trading rooms/clubs, 'dragon's den' competitions
- Part-time work up to 20 hours per week
 e.g. QWORK at QUB campus jobs portal
- Volunteering lots of opportunities for public service and 'giving back'
- Sport quite different to USA in scale/reach but great clubs and opportunity to compete in British University Championships







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
